1. INTRODUCTION

There is no doubt that a horse's hoof is one of the wonders of creation. Perfectly formed and finely adapted to its function, it is a critical factor in the longevity of a horse. This manual is intended to stress the significance of a well-maintained hoof and familiarize you with all its numerous functions.

In our daily work as farriers, we are asked no end of questions about hooves. Unfortunately, there is rarely time to answer them properly, to explain things in more detail or even give a little demonstration. This is one of the reasons that prompted us to summarize the most frequently asked questions and answer them systematically in the form of a reference manual. The result is one of the most comprehensive of equestrian reference books – and this is what you are now holding in your hand.

It is not an all-encompassing scientific study but simply highlights the most important basic facts about horses' hooves. You will find that some of the answers are self-explanatory, dispelling many nagging doubts and uncertainties and providing solutions to common problems. It is not easy to understand the actual importance of the hoof completely, due to its complex structure and interacting mechanisms and processes. Many of these take place simultaneously but can only be described one after the other. That is why you will find numerous cross-references to other chapters in the book, together with some repetition.

This manual is intended as a reference work for riders and horse-owners, and has been written in a language that is easily understood. We are happy to be able to pass on a small proportion of our own practical experience for the benefit of others.
