Häufige Fragen zum Hauptschulabschluss

Wann findet die Prüfung statt?

Im Schuljahr 2019/2020 findet die zentrale Prüfung im Fach Englisch am **12. Mai 2020** statt (Nachschreibtermin: 26. Mai 2020).

Aus welchen Teilen besteht die Prüfung?

Die Prüfung besteht aus zwei Teilen: Im ersten Teil wird das **Hörverstehen** geprüft. Im zweiten Teil folgen Aufgaben zum **Leseverstehen**, zum **Wortschatz** und zum Kompetenzbereich **Schreiben**. Welche Aufgabenformate und Textsorten dich genau in den einzelnen Prüfungsteilen erwarten, kannst du in den entsprechenden Kapiteln in diesem Buch unter „Mögliche Aufgabenformate in der Prüfung“ nachlesen.

Gibt es inhaltliche Schwerpunkte?

Für die kommende Prüfung wurden **Großbritannien** und **Irland** als Bezugskulturen ausgewählt. Du wirst also Aufgaben erhalten, die mit diesen beiden Ländern etwas zu tun haben. Es ist daher ratsam, dass du dich vorab über Großbritannien und Irland informierst. Du kannst z. B. im Internet recherchieren oder eine themenbezogene interessante Dokumentation im Fernsehen oder auf YouTube ansehen. Die Texte und Aufgaben in diesem Buch vermitteln dir ebenfalls nützliches Wissen über verschiedene Länder, in denen Englisch gesprochen wird (über Irland z. B. in *Hörverstehen Test 8* und *Leseverstehen Test 8*, über Großbritannien z. B. in *Hörverstehen Test 4* und *Leseverstehen Test 3*).

Wieviel Zeit habe ich für die Prüfung?

Im Fach Englisch hast du insgesamt **90 Minuten** Zeit. Dabei entfallen ca. 20 Minuten auf den ersten Teil (Hörverstehen) und 70 Minuten auf den zweiten Teil der Prüfung (Leseverstehen – Wortschatz – Schreiben).

Darf ich ein Wörterbuch verwenden?

Nein, das ist leider nicht erlaubt.

Wie setzt sich meine Note zusammen?

Deine Abschlussnote setzt sich aus der Prüfungsnote als Ergebnis deiner schriftlichen Prüfung und der Vornote zusammen. Diese Note beruht auf all deinen Leistungen seit Beginn des Schuljahres.

- ▶ Stimmen Vornote und Prüfungsnote überein, ist die Vornote auch die Abschlussnote. Bei einer Abweichung von einer Note entscheidet dein Fachlehrer zwischen beiden Noten.
- ▶ Falls Vornote und Prüfungsnote um zwei Noten voneinander abweichen, kannst du dich einer freiwilligen mündlichen Prüfung im Fach Englisch unterziehen.

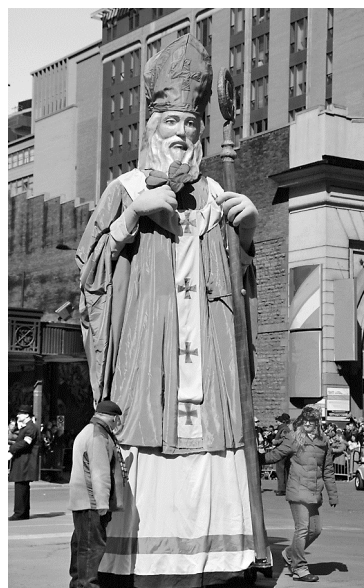

They only lived a few streets away from one another but it might as well have been a thousand miles. They stood and looked at one another and let the hurrying people push round them.

“Fancy a cup of coffee?” asked Kevin. “Have you time?”

“Don’t see why not,” said Sadie.

²⁵ There were many good reasons why not, her mother would say, but Sadie was not one to be put off by reasons, especially her mother’s.

They walked side by side to a coffee bar without talking. They felt a little awkward² walking together but once inside the café, seated across a table from one another, their tongues broke free again.

³⁵ “How’s Brede?” she asked.

“How’s Tommy?” he asked at the same time, and they laughed.

“Brede’s fine,” he said. “She’s working as a nursery nurse.”

⁴⁰ “She always was soft on kids, wasn’t

she? Tommy’s in the yard apprenticed as a welder³.”

They were silent for a moment, Sadie thinking of Kevin’s sister Brede and Kevin of Sadie’s brother Tommy as each had been three years ago. They had all been at school then, different schools. They had started as enemies, had even fought with stones and fists; then for a while they had been friends but eventually had drifted apart because of the difficulties of meeting.

“And you, Sadie, what are you doing?”

⁵⁵ “Me?” She shook her long fair hair back over her shoulder in a gesture that he remembered. “Well, first I went into an office” – she wrinkled her nose – “and then I got a job in a linen mill ...”

⁶⁰ He laughed. “You always were a restless one!”

“Look who’s talking!” They were used to sparring⁴ with one another; it came back to them easily. It was as if the three years had never been.

“I’ve had the same job since the day I left school,” he said. “So there!”

“Is that so?”

“That’s right. I’m working for Kate’s da⁵ in his scrapyards⁶. [...]”

Scrap in the streets: burnt-out cars and buses and armoured⁷ vehicles, torn-up paving stones, barbed-wire⁸ coiled to form barricades. And along the streets went soldiers on patrol with fingers on the triggers of their guns, men and women eyeing them watchfully, suspiciously, and bands of children playing at fighting and sometimes

not just playing. Sadie and Kevin were quiet. The subject was too difficult to talk about, too difficult for them. [...]

Kevin asked, "Are you hungry?"
85 "Starving."

He went to the counter and bought them two hamburgers each. [...]
Outside, the sun shone on the opposite side of the street. Sadie finished her last
90 bite and sighed with contentment.

"It's a warm night," said Kevin. "It would be nice up on Cave Hill."

"It would that."

"Would you like to go up there?"

95 She nodded.

"Now?"

"Yes."

He guided her out of the café into the street and then dropped his hand from her arm. On the way to the bus stop they passed a newspaper billboard. SHOP GUTTED⁹ BY BOMB, TWO KILLED, ONE INJURED, it declared. They both looked away and talked instead of Tommy and Brede, remembering days spent at the seaside the summer they had all been friends.

Hörverstehen Test 8: Saint Patrick’s Day

- 1 On March 17, people around the world celebrate the Irish holiday of Saint Patrick’s Day. It is a major holiday in Ireland, but the rest of the world has influenced its celebration as much as the Irish themselves.

Most Americans think of Saint Patrick’s Day as a big party [...], but its beginnings in Ireland were religious [...]. Ireland is a mostly Roman Catholic country. Saint Patrick lived on the island more than 1,500 years ago, and he is widely considered to have established Christianity in the country. The Church honoured him with a holy day in the 17th century. March 17 marks the date of his death. Saint Patrick is believed to have served in Ireland as a Catholic bishop. One story says that he drove all the snakes out of Ireland.

The average Irish person honoured March 17 quietly. Attending church services was the main activity. In fact, most businesses that served alcohol would close on that day. In the early 1900s, Ireland’s government made Saint Patrick’s Day an official holiday. By the 1960s, towns across Ireland started celebrating the holiday with parades and music. In Ireland today, Saint Patrick’s Day is a four-day public celebration that includes parades, music, food, and games.

For Irish people living outside Ireland, Saint Patrick’s Day became a chance to celebrate their Irish

identity and culture [...]. Now, countries and cities around the world celebrate March 17 in creative ways. Many countries hold Saint Patrick’s Day parades. Famous monuments, including the Great Wall of China, the Colosseum in Rome, the Niagara Falls, and the Gateway of India in Mumbai will all be coloured by green light for the day.

The U.S. is especially famous for its Saint Patrick’s Day celebrations. Many cities with large Irish communities, like Boston, New York and Chicago, hold parades and parties. Cities will also colour local rivers green for the day. Ireland is known as the “Emerald Isle” because the country is covered in deep green grass. [...]

However, many modern Saint Patrick’s Day traditions were invented by the Irish in America. In the U.S. on Saint Patrick’s Day, it is common for Americans to drink green beer or eat corned beef and cabbage, but many of these traditions are not really Irish. [...] Neil O’Flaherty, an Irish citizen now living in the U.S., [...] remembers celebrating Saint Patrick’s Day much differently than it is now. Back then, for Catholic families [in Ireland], it was the day you had to go to church [...]. It had much more the feeling of a religious holiday than a public holiday. He also remembers everyone wearing small, three-leaf plant pieces, called shamrocks. [...]
