PREFACE

Clay sealings and cylinder seals with inscriptions are known to the Egyptological community since the late Nineteenth Century. For the Early Dynastic Period, the inscriptions became a cornerstone for the reconstruction of administration and "history" of that period. Other aspects of the artefacts, like their shape and the containers they were attached to, were mostly neglected for several decades. Fortunately, this approach changed, as the contributions in this volume prove.

The Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft (DFG) funded the project *Verwaltung in Ägypten: die erste Hälfte des 3. Jahrtausends* at Humboldt University Berlin, meant to study seal impressions at three different sites in Egypt. We are grateful to the DFG for not only supporting this project, but also a workshop held at the university from June, 20th to 21st 2019, which provided an opportunity to exchange the latest results on Early Dynastic and Old Kingdom seals and sealings from different perspectives.
